A few weeks ago, I attended the Forum on Youth Ministry at Princeton Seminary in Princeton, NJ. Every presentation and lecture added extremely valuable inspiration to my ministry, and I am grateful for this congregation supporting my continuing education by offering me this opportunity to strengthen my travel muscles and my knowledge base in ministering with adolescents. What is an adolescent? This was a hot topic during the conference. Several

folks like to say that adolescence is a construct of our society in response to the media's exploitation and parent's pampering of children. So, we should start treating our youth like adults. Others pointed out that adolescence has been a recognized period of transition throughout history, showing documentation in medieval paintings and instructional books. So, we should cut them some slack, remember what it was like to feel like we stick out like a sore thumb, and help discover the world alongside them. Our speakers offered statistics, case studies and guidance for ministry with youth at the start of this search for belonging and identity as well as young adults at the close of this transition as they start to embody their discovered identity and when we hope they recognize a belonging in this thing we call "church".

One of the presentations entitled, "Losing Our Religion", looked at how the adolescents of today experience the world and make choices about where they will go and what they will do. Our Speaker, Rev. Erica Liu, who ministers with Presby House at University of Wisconsin at Madison, pointed out one of the biggest challenges in reaching out to these younger generations: FOMO. More and more generations of today are faced with the anxiety produced by the Fear Of Missing Out (FOMO). They don't perceive their multiple RSVP's as over commitment, they truly want to do so many exciting things, and yet on the day of an event, they may take a look at their options by checking Facebook, Instagram, Twitter and Snapchat, and then choose which of these events is the most vital or exciting thing of the moment. Remember, these young adults were raised in a world which was building in activity and access to information as well opportunities which continue to expand. The challenge for today's American young adults is not finding one opportunity, but choosing the best fitted, most enjoyable and exciting path. Isn't this the future we want for our children?

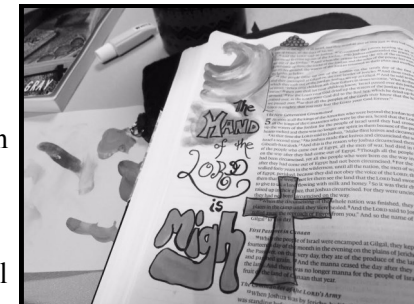

Our Community Dinners take place on Tuesday evenings from 6:00-6:45 p.m. and the Community Breakfasts on Wednesday mornings from 7:30-8:15 a.m. Average attendance at dinner is 35-40 and for breakfasts is 20-25.

Food Pantry News

In March, our Food Pantry served 67 adults and 44 children. We partner with the Flint Hills Breadbasket to help those in our community who are food insecure. The First Presbyterian Food Pantry serves our community on Fridays from 10:00 a.m.-noon and 1:00-3:00 p.m.

This perspective gives me a more grateful appreciation for the youth and young adults who are actively sharing in the ministry of this church. Long gone are the days we can expect young people to show up in church out of duty or obedience. They will come and participate, when they choose to be here. When they see the relevance to what we are doing here at the church and in the community, they will pick up the tools needed to work alongside us. The youth who offered sermons on Youth Sunday spoke to us, because they felt God's message welling up inside them, not because we required them to do it. The temptation for us can be to aspire to try to be "the most exciting thing", but the research shows, the long term commitment choices reflect "the most relevant and impactful thing."

So my guiding question for us as we look to support and encourage the faith of adolescents is how can we invite the youth and the college students to be a part of the relevant and impactful ministries of our church? How do we introduce them to our neighbors who participate in the community meals on Tuesday night and Wednesday morning? How can we use our resources to encourage them to give back to our community? How has this church impacted your life, and how can you tell that story to invite someone else into our community of faith? Have an idea for our leadership? Ask a youth and we'll be on this journey together!

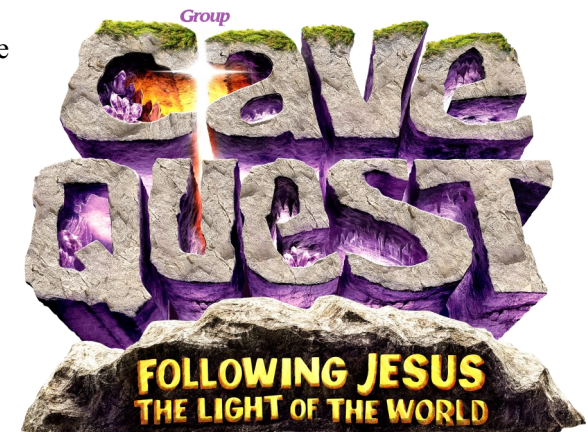
Bible School 2016!

A Note from Health Ministries

"Have mercy on me, Lord, for I am in distress." Psalm 31:9 NIV

More than one million Americans at or over age 40 are currently blind. Vision impairment creates problems for an additional 2.4 million. As Baby Boomers age, these numbers are expected to double. That means this is a problem for all of us. Blindness and visual impairment from many eye diseases and disorders can be reduced when detected and treated early. The leading causes of vision blindness and visual impairment include:

- **Diabetic Retinopathy:** This common complication of diabetes affects and impairs vision in nearly half of all diabetics to some degree over their lifetime. Blood vessels of the retina can break down, become blocked or leak. Effective treatment includes laser surgery and some medications. Diabetics require annual dilated eye exams.
- **Age-Related Macular Degeneration (AMD):** AMD is the most common cause of legal blindness and vision impairment in older Americans because it damages central vision. There is no generally accepted treatment, but laser therapies may reduce the risk of further vision loss.
- **Cataract:** This is the clouding of the lens of the eye and usually appears with

advancing age but can be linked to smoking, diabetes and excessive exposure to sunlight. Surgical treatment can eliminate vision loss by replacing the eye's lens.

- **Glaucoma:** Vision loss is caused by gradual damage to the optic nerve which carries visual information from the eye to the brain. Vision loss is not noticed until significant nerve damage has occurred so screenings are important for early diagnosis when it can be controlled. Any vision loss cannot be restored.

We have a responsibility to care for our eyesight. God has given us our body and the resources to care for it. In I Corinthians 3:16 Paul tells us, "You yourselves are God's temple and ... God's spirit lives in you." In verse 9 he says, "You are God's field, God's building." By seeing our eye doctor regularly for vision exams and following our doctor's advice, we become good stewards of our bodies. We use the resources God has given us so we can become the extraordinary servants He intends us to be.
